Parents are advised that Swap Shop is on **Thursday 7th December, 2017** from **6.30pm – 8.00pm**. Parents and students will be able to buy and sell books directly to each other on that night.

Please note that access to the College has been restricted due to the redevelopment and refurbishment works currently being undertaken. The Dobson Road entrance to the College has been closed. Entrance to the College can be gained via the Simms Road roadway entrance to the College or the Basketball Stadium carpark at the end of Simms Road.

As in previous years, the procedure will be as follows:

SNAKE ALERT

An urgent and important reminder to all students who travel to and from school using the Plenty River path or the sports ovals that they need to be aware tiger snakes are usually active at this time of the year, and that for the last seven years they have been very aggressive during hot weather. Environmental experts predict that snake sightings will become more prevalent this year. I have spoken to a field officer from the City of Banyule, and he said that short bursts of warm weather and sunshine resulted in snakes emerging from the scrub near the river and sunning themselves on paths and concrete surfaces. We have also had some Council warning signs installed near the river paths warning pedestrians to “Beware of Snakes”.

In February some eight years ago one of our own students was bitten by a snake while walking near the river path at Simms Road Oval, and he spent a considerable amount of time in hospital. There are now warning signs along the path but all students and pedestrians need to exercise extreme caution when travelling to and from school along the river tracks. It is comforting to know that we have a great network of neighbours and pedestrians who use the river path and if there are any sightings of snakes they let the College know immediately.

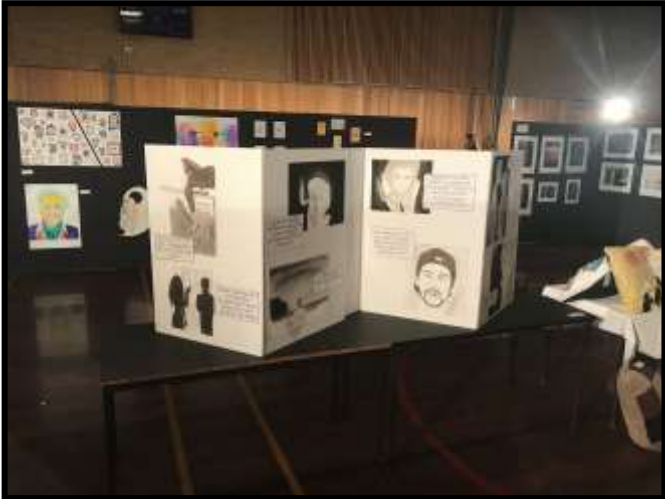

On Demand Testing Standard Score Scale Review Project

Our school currently uses On Demand testing to provide our teachers with insights into your child's literacy and numeracy development. Following a request from the Victorian Curriculum and Assessment Authority (VCAA), which is responsible for the development of On Demand, I am informing you of our school's participation in a project to review the On Demand tests. This review will involve the equating of students' On Demand test outcomes with the school's NAPLAN data. Towards this end, the school will grant the VCAA permission to collect our On Demand data.

The data collected will contain test results and associated student details from On Demand assessments at our school for 2017. Our data, along with data from other schools will be used in a one-time linking process between On Demand and NAPLAN results held by the VCAA to form a single dataset. This dataset will then be anonymised and used to review the performance of the On Demand Tests. All identified data collected will be destroyed at the completion of the process and there will be no release of any school or individual results or personal details as part of this work.

This work will benefit our school by further enhancing the reliability and accuracy of the On Demand tests.

ON DEMAND TESTING REVIEW PROJECT FAQs FOR PARENTS

[Our school and the '2017 On Demand Testing Review Project'](#)

Our school currently uses On Demand testing to provide our teachers with insights into your child's literacy and numeracy development. The school supports the Victorian Curriculum and Assessment Authority's (VCAA) project to review the performance of the On Demand tests. This review will equate students' On Demand test outcomes with the school's NAPLAN data. Towards this end, the school will grant the VCAA permission to collect the school's On Demand data.

[What data will be collected by the VCAA for the 2017 On Demand Review Project?](#)

The process involves the collection of data about:

On Demand test usage and delivery,
Students' responses to On Demand test questions, and
Students' identification details.

[How will the data be used?](#)

The VCAA will analyse students' On Demand tests and test usage. The results of this analysis will be equated with NAPLAN data held by the VCAA to review the On Demand Test Scales. This comparative data will be used to further enhance the reliability and accuracy of the On Demand tests.

[How will the VCAA store On Demand data and who will have access to the data?](#)

The On Demand data and student details will be handled in accordance with the VCAA [Privacy Policy](#) and student details will be stored on a password protected internal system within the VCAA. The data will be available to On Demand team members and the VCAA psychometrician for analysis. The VCAA will destroy personal information once the On Demand test review is completed. On Demand test usage and question response data will be retained for future reference.

[Will On Demand data be used for any other purpose than reviewing the On Demand tests and test usage?](#)

No. The primary focus of the 2017 data collection is to review the On Demand Test Scales which generate students' results.

[Will school and student results be passed to other organisations?](#)

No. Students and school performance for On Demand tests will not be analysed nor will students or school performance information be disclosed to other parties.

[My child is already exempted from sitting NAPLAN tests, how can I have my child exempted from the On Demand Review Project?](#)

Your child will be automatically exempted from the review of the On Demand tests and test usage if your child is exempted from sitting NAPLAN tests.

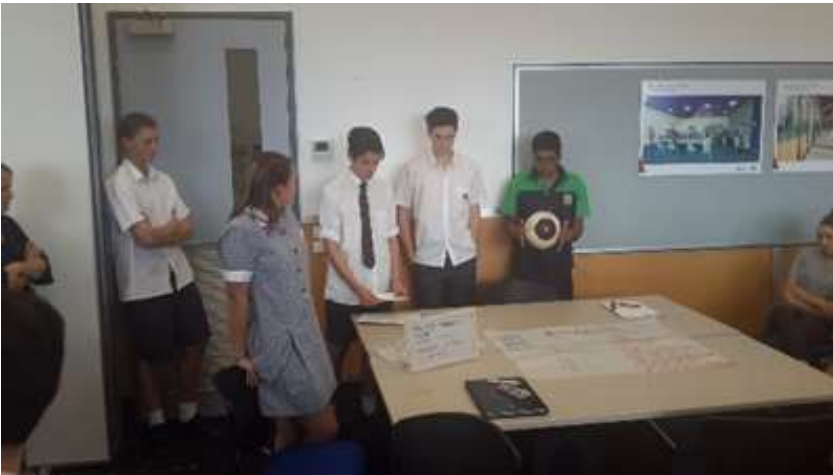
It is recommended that you contact the school to discuss with your child's teachers how they are using On Demand testing as part of the school's program of student learning, assessment and reporting.

CAREERS NEWS

One of the current State Government's major policies at the last election was to establish 8 "Tech Schools" across the State. We are very fortunate that one of those Tech Schools – the Banyule Nillumbik Tech School – will be opening next year at the Melbourne Polytechnic site in Civic Drive, Greensborough.

There has been a great deal of planning over the last couple of years and we are now at the stage where the building program is well under way and curriculum planning is going "full steam ahead".

Montmorency Secondary College, along with other schools in the area has been playing a very active part in the planning process and we have 2 staff and 2 student ambassadors working behind the scenes to help bring it all together. One of the lead-up events will be a "Maker Faire" where secondary schools will showcase some STEAM (Science Technology Engineering Arts and Maths) ideas to an audience of local primary school students. The maker faire will be held on Friday 8th December at the Tech School site.

The focus of the Tech School will be on the areas of Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Maths – know as the STEAM subjects. Schools will have access to a wide range of high tech facilities where dedicated spaces have been designed for idea generation, visual communication and design and production. Schools will be able to utilise the facilities for any of their STEAM subject related projects.

The most recent planning day saw groups of students from the partner schools formed into teams to design and produce a prototype solution to a "real world" issue. The aim of the exercise was to refine the learning goals and processes that will be the mainstay of learning at the Tech School. It is anticipated that the first groups of students will be working on their school projects from June 2018.
