We are so proud of the results of the cohort and report there were 19 40+ scores from a range of subjects:

48% of the cohort had ATARs above 70, which continues the improved results we have been seeing over the last 4 years.

ADF Long Tan Youth Leadership and Teamwork Award

The Australian Defence Force (ADF) Long Tan Youth Leadership and Teamwork Awards commenced in 2006 to foster the development of youth in relation to behaviour and attributes considered essential in Australia's future leaders. The awards are a means to formally recognise those students who have demonstrated leadership and teamwork within their school and the broader community. At the same time, the awards recognise students who display strong personal ethical values, such as doing one's best, respecting others and "mateship" - aspects considered essential to the ADF and Australian Society.

Year 10 recipient: Libby Fischer

Since the age of 11 Libby has been sharing her work through conservation talks that she has given to primary schools, Scouts, Guides, kindergartens, and youth programs. Through these presentations, Libby has been spreading awareness for wildlife

conversation and demonstrating that we can all have a voice. Her student agency validates that everyone can do something, no matter how big or small it is, it's about making an impact. Libby finds that kids relate more to someone younger rather than an adult and being able to have that connection with kids is what helps her to inspire them. She shares ideas on the things that young people can do to show them that everyone can do something, no matter how young or old.

This year Libby teamed up with Jane Goodall's Roots and Shoots to start an environmental program where they aim to bring primary school kids together to learn about what they can do for our environment. She started planning events that kids could participate in and learn new things. Through 'Eco Kids of Nillumbik' Libby reached out to the local primary schools, asking if they had any kids who wanted to join the program and promoted it through social media. The first event took place in May with a Clean Up Event in our community (Diamond Creek). Libby was not only



able to get the Eco Kids involved, but also the local community and everyone came down to help clean up the creek and learn the ways they can help their local environment. Events are now planned each season where kids will be able to attend and learn new things.

ADF Future Innovators Award

The Australian Defence Force (ADF) Future Innovators Award has been designed to recognise recipients' science and mathematics abilities while highlighting the value that the Navy, Army and Air Force place on STEM skills and STEM career opportunities within Defence. The awards are a means to formally recognise those students who have demonstrated motivation and innovation in the areas of STEM within their school, and who display strong personal ethical values, such as doing one's best.

Year 10 Recipient: Rylie Gunasekera

Rylie has undertaken acceleration mathematical methods VCE Units 1 & 2 in Year 10. Within this group, he consistently uses previous knowledge, gained from both inside and outside of school to help with studying in an advanced subject. His longing for self-innovation in STEM is also reflected in his future ambitions. For Year 11, he plans to undertake several maths and science subjects, including chemistry, physics, mathematical methods, and specialist maths. Riley is motivated by his ambition to undertake a maths course at university.

For as long as he can remember, Riley has been going out of his way to investigate topics that interest him. One of these topics is aircraft, particularly airplanes. Despite the content, Riley's love for aircraft drove him to watch an hour-long show, Air Crash Investigations, aired on television every Tuesday night. He researched outside of that time too, to understand the scientific backing behind how aircraft worked. At an age as young as seven, he was trying his best to understand why



lift was generated and how behemoth pieces of metal could fly. This motivation has continued for many years, including attending the Avalon Air Show and visiting the aircraft lab in Swinburne University in 2015, and visiting the RMIT Control Tower Simulator in 2016. Rylie's motivation has driven him to push himself, seeking different ways to tailor his interests and finding ways to learn more about the topics he loves.

The University of Melbourne Kwong Lee Dow Young Scholars Program

Professor Kwong Lee Dow is a former University Vice-Chancellor, a distinguished education scholar, and an active contributor to curriculum reforms. He has held various Victorian government positions, including chair of the Victorian Curriculum and Assessment Authority. He was appointed Member of the Order of Australia in 1984 and in 2012, was made an Officer of the Order. He has received various awards and recognition for his achievements and leadership.

In 2007, the University of Melbourne welcomed 700 of Victoria's most talented secondary students as the inaugural Kwong Lee Dow Young Scholars. Today, the number of Young Scholars who have participated in the program has reached more than 8000 students from 500 participating schools.
