FROM THE PRINCIPAL

As we enter the final weeks of Term Two, I wish to take the time to express gratitude and appreciation for students, families, teachers and staff. It has been a rugged term with illness, assessment and activities alongside the teaching and learning program. In a year that we thought would 'get back to normal'... it is increasingly clear that there is a new normal in schools and we still manage uncertainty on a daily basis.

To provide some further insight into the daily life of a teacher and to explore some of the challenges. To think about the expectations and sheer persistence and determination that our teachers show on each and every day to ensure that our students have every opportunity for success. So consider this...

A week or so, this term, as a teacher at Monty....

So... this week, I am teaching one of my year 8 English classes, and in this class there are three students absent with COVID: one returning tomorrow; four away who are unwell and a couple of household contacts wearing masks. I have an assessment in progress, where students are catching up, finalising their drafts. I'm meeting with students and giving feedback, ensuring that there is work on Google Classroom for my absent students and actively teaching those who are in the room.

We are in a kind of stretched phase of the unit where there are students who are about a week behind and in catch up mode; there are students who are on track; and those who are ahead and finished. There are those who I need to make adjustments for because they need extending or challenging, and those who need simplified or modified work.

There are 23 students in my class and on any given day, there are at least five students who are absent or just returned and we are never really all quite on the same page in each lesson. I feel like I am teaching on a moving landscape, constantly. We are finalising and getting ready to move on to the next unit of study, where this pattern will continue.

My students reach out and email to check in where they are at, and I email others to make sure that they are on track; and talk to the students regularly who are in the room with me. And oh boy, the marking... Who has completed what? What has been submitted? Have I given feedback? This is for one class, who I see four hours per week. I have three other classes and one of them is a Year 12 class.

On a Saturday morning, I text my boss to let her know that I have come down with COVID. We then talk about how the next week will work – please set work for classes on Google Classroom use Webex to teach my Year 12's remotely (as long as I feel well enough). I spend the weekend preparing work that my students will be able to do without me there, and hope that I am well enough to respond to their questions and support them remotely – even though they will have another teacher in the room. I can't really bare to think about what I will need to do when I do get back to work...

Following 2020 and 2021, schools are very different places and there is still a high degree of uncertainty that occurs on any given day. Which teachers and students will be absent today? Which teachers and students might be off for a period of time? Which teacher is going to help carry the load for another teacher who is absent? How do we catch up those students who have been absent, may be behind or need pushing? All the while there are timelines that we can't shift or extend.

I take this opportunity to give you a little insight into what happens on any given day, in any given week in a school term post-Remote Learning, to remind you that as schools we are very grateful to be open, have our students in the hallways, the yards and the classrooms, and be able to provide the education in a social learning environment. But the landscape is very different from what we are used to, and we are all still adjusting. Our staff and students are doing their very best to keep their learning progressing but also acknowledge that sometimes 'catch up' is simply not possible. Teachers still ensure that essential learning, knowledge and skills are being developed. Staff at Montmorency carry each and every student with pride and intentional care.

We also know that this continues to be a challenging time to be a parent and a student. Persistence and resilience in this time are still needed more than ever.

Take a moment to thank a teacher. Thank a staff member. And remember to operate with kindness and care for all of the staff here at Montmorency as we continue to grow the culture of our wonderful school community through continued care and respect for each other.

Camps & Excursions

The Year 8 Camp to Billabong Ranch was a highlight for students and staff alike; and a wonderful opportunity for students to be back and experiencing these types of activities. Year 9 City Experience also highlighted the range of city based locations and further opportunities to learn. A highlight was the Amazing Race that was run by the VCAL class for the Year 9 students, as part of their learning outcomes for their VCAL course.

Excursions, Sport and activities continue to run across the school, and are valuable and valued learning experiences – however, they do continue to add pressure to the daily operations of the College further impacting staffing and coverage of classes.

Student Wellbeing

We welcome back Violet Awad in term 3, as our Mental Health Practitioner who continues to support the College. There are a range of programs and that are in place to support students.

The Year 7 Engage Day ran earlier this term, and students had a positive day engaging in leadership, connection and teamwork activities. This provides a place for students to practice and develop resilience, positive interactions with each other and have fun!

There is a Year 8 Engage Day planned for the start of term 3 which will also focus on the development of this student cohort, focus on relationships, connection and leadership opportunities.

Pathways, Course Counselling & Subject Selection

Year 10 Work Experience was a positive learning experience for many students to explore the workplace, independence and the types of industries out there – including some of the future career pathways they may enter in to! It has been a positive opportunity for students to experience this, particularly following the last couple of years where access to workplace learning for students have been limited.

Year 9 Career Profiling, EPICC & Morrisby plays a big part of the year 9 program and getting them ready and organised for pathway progression into the Senior School. They engage in careers profiling, interviews, Morrisby testing that profiles student strength aligned to potential career pathways supported by parent information evenings. Thank you to Michael Weeding for his leadership in this space.

VCE Reforms: VCE & VCE VM: The Vocational Major Planning is in place to best enable transition to the new Vocational Major. There has been information in the newsletter, the Year 9 EPICC parent nights have provided some knowledge towards the pathways; and we have been planning all year so that Montmorency is in the best place to implement the changes.

More information will be provided through students and parent information nights next term.

Thank you for your support, care and understanding. Have a restful school holidays and we look forward to Term 3!

INTERACT/VCAL BUSHFIRE RECOVERY CAMP- CORRYONG

On Monday 9th May, 13 Senior VCAL students left Monty to travel to Corryong. Corryong is a small town in Victoria, 120 kilometres east of Albury-Wodonga, near the upper reaches of the Murray River and close to the New South Wales border.

Interact & VCAL students organised the camp to build community connections and assist mental health outcomes for young people in Corryong after they were adversely affected by the Black Summer fires in 2019-20.

The trip began by touring Glenrowan and learning about the history of the Ned Kelly Gang in the area, followed by a visit to the interactive museum. After several hours of travel, the students settled into their accommodation at the Colac Caravan Park (also known as "Clack Clack") and cooked dinner in the communal kitchen. Everyone contributed to the meal, and it was delicious.

The next morning, half our group rode bikes into the town centre, while the other half travelled by bus, to meet up with the VCAL students from Corryong P-12 College. Our first activity was an 'Amazing Race' organised and guided by the VCAL students from Corryong College. Monty students learnt about the historical sites and rich history surrounding the area. We went to the 'Man from Snowy River' Museum and had lunch in the local park. Corryong VCAL students organised games of lawn bowls where we met some local farmers, keen to teach us the tips and tricks of rolling a set of bowls. The evening set in and we had to warm up back at the caravan park. That evening, the local Rotary Club of Corryong hosted us for a pizza dinner. Locals told us their accounts of the Black Summer fires and how it affected their physical and mental health. We heard harrowing stories about the uncertainty of the fires and the aftermath of their destruction, including youth suicides.

Day 2 started with the 'Blue Tree Project'. Local staff from Corryong Community Health and the VCAL students from Corryong, joined our class to paint three cut-out tree silhouettes. We painted them blue and painted slogans such as, "It's OK to not be OK". These trees will be put up around Corryong as a place for people to meet and reflect. The local newspaper wrote an article on our 'Blue Tree Project' and we spent the afternoon interviewing young people about their stories of COVID-19 lockdowns and bushfire recovery. The Corryong students returned home, and we got ready to participate in the town's trivia night. The evening was a great success, and we went well in the local competition.

Our final day was spent visiting a dairy farm and learning about the career pathways available in regional areas. We went to see the gorgeous little dairy calves and enjoyed patting them while listening to the farmer tell us his daily routine. The Corryong VCAL students are coming to Melbourne in August, and we look forward to showing them around the city. Our trip home was spent chatting and reflecting on how much we'd learnt about each other.

Senior School Reforms 2023

Victoria is moving to a new integrated senior secondary certificate that will bring together our two senior secondary certificates, the Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE) and Victorian Certificate of Applied Learning (VCAL).

This will give all students the learning opportunities to develop the skills and capabilities needed to succeed in further education, work and life.

From 2023, enrolment options for Year 11 and 12 students will include:

- the Victorian Certificate of Education
- the Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE) Vocational Major

A fully integrated VCE will be implemented from 2025. For more information on the certificates please visit the Victorian Curriculum Assessment Authority website. The existing VCE will remain the same and is still the pathway for a scored VCE towards an ATAR.

New VCE Vocational Major

The VCE Vocational Major (replacing the current VCAL program) is a 2-year vocational and applied learning program within the VCE. The program aims to equip students with the skills, knowledge, confidence, and agency needed to prepare for the world of work and further education and training.

The VCE Vocational Major will prepare students to transition successfully into apprenticeships, traineeships, further education and training, university, TAFE or directly into employment.

The VCE Vocational Major will support students to develop both academic and practical skills. It employs a more diverse range of assessment strategies rather than exams, alleviating some of the pressure that students face when considering the VCE.

For more information on the VCE Vocational Major please visit the Victorian Curriculum Assessment Authority website. The **VPC** is an inclusive Year 11 and 12 certificate that will meet the needs of the minority of students not able or ready to complete a certificate at the VCE level.

What does this mean for our students at Montmorency Secondary College

- 1. Year 11 students undertaking VCAL Intermediate in 2022 will continue undertaking Senior VCAL units in 2023 and will be enrolled into the VCE Vocational Major during a one-year transition period.
- 2. Year 10 students who would have previously selected a VCAL pathway will enrol into the VCE Vocational Major (replacing the VCAL program). This will be a two-year program in-line with the current VCE
- 3. Year 10 students who would normally do VCE with a study score and ATAR in the 3 & 4 sequence will select VCE subjects in-line with their pathway choices and pre-requisites required for University in 2025.
- 4. It is still possible for VCE students to undertake a VET course and VCE Vocational Major students can select a VCE subject complementing their pathway plan.

VCE is changing from 2023


Victoria's senior secondary education is changing.





It can be challenging meeting new people, or catching up with a friend after a long time has passed.












All current Year 9 parents and students are welcome to attend an information session which will outline details of the Year 10 course, which is set out differently to what you will have become accustomed to from Years 7-9. During the presentation the Year 10 course structure, subject selection process and assessments will be explained. Issues relating to accelerated study, VCE, VCE Vocational Major, VET and further study will also be outlined. Teachers from all learning areas will be on hand at the end of the presentation to answer any questions.




