FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Welcome back for 2023!

We are excited to welcome the College community back to Montmorency Secondary College for the 2023 school year! It is sure to be an exciting year ahead as we move through continued curriculum planning where teachers are exploring the impact of their teaching on student learning and embedding resilience into classrooms. We have a number of new staff on board this year, of whom we are really pleased to welcome into the Monty community.

2022 VCE Results

Our VCE results were pleasing, where we maintained our achievement across the cohort and saw some really impressive results. The College has supported all of our students into attaining their pathways, and a very impressive 100% of students completed their VCE. The broad range of ATAR results, with over 25% of students attaining an 80+ ATAR, and 4.3% of students achieving a 40+ score in their subjects.



Jemima Cuthbert-Novak

The Dux of the College was Jemima Cuthbert-Novak who attained an impressive 97.7 ATAR and has been successful in obtaining a place at Melbourne University as her first preference, in Arts / Teaching.

Mia Zapulla achieved a very impressive result in Outdoor Education, a perfect score of 50. This result shows that Mia performed in the top 0.3% of students enrolled in the subject for 2022.

80% of students received their first preferences for University Placements, with students undertaking placements at a range of universities. 46% of students have been offered a place at Latrobe University, 23% at RMIT University, 9% at Melbourne University and a broad range of other providers. We are very proud of this cohort, with most students being made an offer in the first round.

2023 Student Planners

Your student should have come home from the College with a student planner for 2023! We are reinvigorating the use of student planners to aid organisation and preparation, and to help manage homework, study and assignments.

Following remote learning, students have demonstrated a need to be better supported through organisation, and further develop these skills. We have elected to use the Resilience Project Planners due to the range of additional supports around resilience, organisation and mindset.

Home Group teachers will be supporting student use of planners, teachers will be encouraging students to write in homework, assignments and reminders. And we encourage parents to discuss planners and organisation at home with your children.

School Review

The College will be undertaking a whole school review based on Strategic Plan from the last four years. We will be involving a range of stakeholders in the process, including teaching staff, education support staff, students and parents. We are proud of the College's progress and continue to celebrate the successes throughout the College's journey.

Once we receive the outcomes of the Review, the College will communicate this to the College community and also develop our goals for the next four years.

ChatGPT

The evolution of technology and its impact on education is ongoing, and the advent of Artificial Intelligence is not a novel concept. However, the availability of AI through ChatGPT represents a noteworthy development that will inevitably influence education.

ChatGPT is a state-of-the-art chatbot that utilises natural language processing and sources its content from textbooks, websites, and articles to develop its language for human interaction. It is capable of generating responses to questions and adapting its responses to the requested style.

In accordance with the Department of Education and Training networks, access to ChatGPT will be restricted for students while they investigate the User Agreement to the platform. However, students may have access to ChatGPT through home or mobile internet when not in a DET network. Please be mindful as the user agreement indicates this is for students 18+.

Time in Lieu

As part of the Victorian Schools Government Agreement 2022, the full implementation of Time in Lieu will be applied for staff. This means that any activities that run outside of school hours are eligible for teachers to have time in lieu accrued for their work outside of hours.

This will have a significant impact on the College – particularly for information evenings and Camps. Therefore, the range of activities that the College will be able to run throughout the year will be limited as we consider the best ways of minimising the impact on teaching and learning outcomes. We are making every effort to maintain our current program, however, this will be challenging with staffing and funding. We will make every effort to minimise the impact on student learning.

Personal Accident Insurance & Ambulance Cover

The Department does not provide personal accident insurance or ambulance cover for students. Parents/carers of students, who do not have student accident insurance/ambulance cover, are responsible for paying the cost of medical treatment for injured students, including the cost of ambulance attendance or transport as well as any other transport costs. Parents/carers can purchase insurance policies from commercial insurers.

Private property brought to school by students, staff or visitors is not insured and the Department does not accept any responsibility for any loss or damage. This can include mobile phones, calculators, toys, sporting equipment and cars parked on school premises. As the Department does not hold insurance for personal property brought to schools and has no capacity to pay for any loss or damage to such property, students and staff should be discouraged from bringing any unnecessary or particularly valuable items to school.

Back to school is an exciting time for students and families, as we settle into a new year. It is important to note that it can be a big step, particularly for those starting in Year 7 or starting at Monty for the new school year. It is usual for students to feel tired, and a bit overwhelmed with change – but it is vital that you support these with positive conversation at home, encourage positive friendships and reach out to us at the College if further support is needed.

HOMEWORK CLUB

Homework Club runs from 3:15pm-4:15pm every Wednesday in the Resource Centre.

Some information about Homework Club:

- It is a nice quiet place for students to get their homework done with the support of teachers.
- Any student can attend Homework Club anytime, no need to let me know or fill out any paperwork, students can turn up, the doors are open.
- Usually, 5-10 teachers volunteer their time to support students there each week, from a range of learning area specialities.
- I am always present and I am a Maths/Science teacher, so there is always Maths (all year levels) & Science (up to Year 10) specific help.
- We have many regular students who attend every Homework Club as they find it a good place to get their homework 'over and done with' and be kept on task. Many students feel they are much more productive at Homework Club than they are at home.
- Even though it only officially runs until 4:15pm, I usually stay until around 5:30pm and some students choose to stay until closing time.
- Some students are 'sent' to Homework Club officially by their teachers to catch up on overdue work or to sit an
 assessment resit. If this is the case, your student's teacher will contact you to let you know they expect your student
 to attend. If your student cannot attend for whatever reason, you need to let the teacher know and organise another
 time for the overdue work to be completed.
- We also have a volunteer run 'Maths/Science' Homework Club which runs similarly on Monday afternoon, however, students cannot be formally 'sent' there (all students attending Monday afternoon are there by their own choice to get support/work quietly). Monday Homework Club is run by volunteer Maths and Science teachers.
- I recommend that every student should try Homework Club at least once (if they are free Monday or Wednesday after school), so they are aware of how it works and of the productive energy of the space/people who occupy it.

From 6 February 2023, the routine two dose HPV vaccine schedule provided to young people aged 12-13 years through the National Immunisation Program (NIP) has become a single dose schedule using the same Gardasil®9 vaccine.

What is the HPV vaccine?

The Gardasil[®]9 vaccine protects against HPV infection, which is a common viral infection, usually affecting the genitals and spread through sexual contact. The vaccine is most effective when given before exposure to the virus, that is before a person becomes sexually active. More information about HPV and the HPV vaccine can be found <u>on the Better Health Channel</u>.

How has the HPV vaccine schedule changed?

From 6 February 2023, the recommended HPV vaccine schedule for most people has **changed from two-doses to a single dose** course using the same Gardasil®9 vaccine. There is no change to the amount of vaccine that is given in the single dose.

The schedule **has not changed for immunocompromised people.** A 3-dose schedule of HPV vaccine is recommended for people with severely immunocompromising conditions, regardless of their age when they started vaccination.

Why was this change made?

The change is based on advice from the Australian Technical Advisory Group on Immunisation (ATAGI), who have considered and reviewed the latest international clinical evidence. ATAGI support the large volume of clinical findings that a single dose of HPV vaccine provides about the same protection as two doses of HPV vaccine.

What do you need to do?

If you have already given consent for your child's HPV vaccination you do not need to take any further action.

Your council immunisation service will seek your consent for vaccinations delivered to students at school as usual.

STOPIT service

STOPIT is a new Victoria Police text notification service enabling commuters, including school students, to report any form of inappropriate behaviour that makes them feel uncomfortable, frightened or threatened on the public transport network.

How **STOPIT** works

The STOPIT service enables commuters to use their mobile phone to promptly, easily and discreetly report inappropriate behaviours.

To use the service, commuters simply text 'STOPIT' to 0499 455 455. This triggers an automated response that includes a link to where the commuter can provide more details about what's just happened.

When people report these types of inappropriate behaviours, police can investigate and identify offenders to improve safety on public transport for everyone.

Parents and carers are encouraged to consider discussing the new service with students who travel on public transport. Students who use mobile phones outside of school hours are encouraged to save the STOPIT number in their mobile phone.

Please note, **STOPIT** is for reporting non-urgent incidents on public transport. Always phone 000 in an emergency.

Secondary School Attendance

Going to school every day is the single most important part of your teenager's education.

Students learn new things at school every day – missing school puts them behind.

SCHOOL IS BETTER WHEN YOUR TEENAGER IS THERE

Why it's important

We all want our students to get a great education, and the building blocks for a great education begin with students coming to school each and every day.

Students develop good habits by going to school every day – habits that are necessary to succeed after school, whether in the workplace or in further study.

Missing school can have a big impact on students academically and socially. It can affect their test results, including VCE & VCAL, and, just as importantly, it can affect their relationships with other students, and lead to social isolation.

There is no safe number of days for missing school – each day a student misses puts them behind, and can affect their educational outcomes.

Each missed day is associated with falling behind in subject topics and assessment tasks, and lead to fewer subject choices and may impact on achievement in years 11 and 12 and post-school pathways.

Getting in early

It's never too late to improve attendance. Even in the middle years, when school can seem the most challenging for students and when attendance rates can be at their lowest, going to school more often can make a big difference. **Every day counts**.

Schools are there to help – if you're having attendance issues with your child, speak to your school about ways to address those issues.

Student Absences

The main reasons for absence are:

Sickness – There are always times when students need to miss school, such as when they're ill. It's vital that they're only away on the days they are genuinely sick, and setting good sleep patterns, eating well and exercising regularly can make a big difference.

Family holidays - It's vital that holidays are planned during school holidays where possible, and not during the term. If you are planning to go on holiday during term time, make sure that you talk to your school in advance, and work with them to develop an absence learning plan.

"**Day off**" – Think twice before letting your teenager have a "day off" as they could fall behind their classmates – every day counts.

Truancy – This is when students choose not to go to school without their parent's permission or skip out of school during the day. There can be many reasons for truancy; the best way to address this is for schools and parents to work together.

While all absences can effect academic performance, DET's statistics show that unexcused absences are a much stronger indicator of lower reading and maths achievement.

School refusal - School refusing children experience significant emotional distress not only when going to school but also at the thought of going to school; they may be absent from school for weeks or even months at a time. School refusal differs from truancy as children generally stay home with the knowledge of the parents and despite their best efforts to encourage their child to go to school. See: <u>My child or teenager has anxiety</u>

If your teenager is away

If for any reason your teenager must miss school, there are things you can do with your school to ensure they don't fall behind:

- Inform the school via your teen's Form/Home Room teacher or Year Level Coordinator
- Find out what work your teenager needs to do to keep up.
- Develop an absence learning plan with your teenager's teacher and ensure they complete the plan.

Remember, every day counts. If your teenager must miss school, speak with your home room teacher or year level coordinator as early as possible.

Openly communicating with your teenager's school about all absences is a good way to prevent attendance issues being escalated to a School Attendance Officer. A School Attendance Officer is a Department of Education and Training Regional Director who has authority to follow up attendance issues. Chronic or ongoing attendance issues that are escalated can lead to an Infringement Notice being issued to parent/s.

If you're having attendance issues with your teenager, please let the year level coordinator, wellbeing coordinator, principal or other relevant staff member know so you can work together to get your teen to school every day.

TOP ATTENDANCE TIPS FOR PARENTS

- Schools want to work in partnership with parents act early if you have any concerns by contacting your child's school and asking for advice and support
- Remember that every day counts
- There is no safe number of days for missing school each day a student misses puts them behind, and can affect their educational outcomes and their social connectedness
- Talk positively about school and the importance of attending every day
- Open and prompt communication with your child's school about all absences is a good idea
- Avoid making routine medical and dental appointments during the school day or planning family holidays during the term.
- Seek help from your school if you are concerned about your child's attendance and wellbeing. Schools want to work in partnership with parents to support student attendance and wellbeing.
